Trust projects

"Project Rot" has been completed to plan, in spite of some of the additional discoveries along the way. Thanks to Jackie Cook's work and the generosity of the Cambridgeshire Historic Churches Trust, it has been funded part by grant and part loan. William Baxter has done a great job managing the project even managing to secure £200 for recycling the unwanted radiators!

Coffin Discovery

During the works to improve the drainage along the south aisle wall (a potential source of the rot), Robbie Lander and Jason Green discovered a limestone coffin. Adrian Challands, a local Archaeological Geophysicist from Helpston, was asked to investigate and report.



Adrian's report establishes that the south aisle wall (1230) was built over the coffin in its original burial location rather than the coffin being moved and used to prop up the wall. He discovered evidence of subsidence which had been repaired and tracked this back to the building of a vault inside the church for John Lawrence and Mary Wright in the 19th Century. Adrian's investigation also uncovered the footings of an earlier porch.

6th May Roman Birth of a Saxon Church - St. Kyneburgha's first 700 years

This is the last in our current History Series: a look at the foundations of the present church out of the foundations of the Roman Praetorium. What is the St Kyneburgha Building Preservation Trust?

The Trust was set up in 2000 to deal with what became our first project, the crisis of the East Window which was in serious need of repair.

The church of St. Kyneburgha is one of two Cambridgeshire entries in the top 100 churches in the country. (The other is the church at Barnack which also has a Building Preservation Trust). Over the last 9 years, the Trust has funded 8 projects including the rejuvenation of the porch, contributing to the heating, re-siting the 7th century Saxon figure and setting up the mensa - a 14th Century altar in the Lady Chapel.

Built by the Normans St. Kyneburgha's church was built by the Normans on the site of a Roman Palace and dedicated in 1124. It is one of the oldest buildings in the country, Grade 1 listed, with features of great interest to architectural historians and admirers of Anglo Saxon building expertise. Any repairs or adjustments to the church require specialist architectural guidance and workmanship. It is, perhaps inevitably, an expensive building to maintain.

The Trust is responsible for raising money, deciding which projects to fund, managing projects and communication. As a registered charity its mission is to maintain, improve and enhance the building and surrounds of this ancient church.
