Church effigies targeted by gang stealing to order

"The stone effigy of a 13th century Bishop of Hereford is the latest in a series of medieval monuments stolen from unlocked country churches in recent months. At least half a dozen thefts are believed to have been carried out by the same gang stealing to order for wealthy collectors abroad."

Hard on the heels of the crisis for churches across the country with lead theft, our ancient churches are being targeted for their ancient artefacts. When I read this article online, the comments left were nearly as tragic as the theft! "Nobody goes to churches anymore so why worry?" "The church has lots of money – so why does it not pay for surveillance?"

These ancient buildings and their contents mark our cultural development as a nation – the ancient architecture, the craftsmanship, the stories of people and communities behind the art and decorations.

We are fortunate in this area that regardless of belief, people care about Kyneburgha's and so the support we continue to have as a charity responsible for preserving and improving the building and its situation is fantastic. Our projects have included improving the security of ancient stones and carvings. We have helped with the practical improvement of securing the church following the lead thefts and we will offer help in identifying and reducing risks to the church contents in the light of this news.

Stephen led the English Heritage financed excavation with the support of local archaeological groups. Stephen will present the 'findings and conclusions' from the dig and subsequent research and put it in context with the story of Britain in the 1st Century AD. During this period the Romans faced fierce resistance from the local Iceni tribes. Learn about the defeat of the mysterious disappearing Roman Ninth Legion and Water Newton (Durobrivae), around 2000 years ago when the village was close to one of the richest towns and great industrial centres in Roman Britain.
